The concrete foundation for the administration building at the St. Johns municipal terminal was poured last Saturday, and construction of the building will proceed at once. The building is to contain the offices of the operating department of the terminal. It will be a two-story frame structure 40x42 feet. The office staff is now housed in a corner of pier No. 1.

A plant to manufacture veneer is being installed in the building formerly occupied by the Oregon Wood Distilling company at Whitwood Court. The new plant will be owned and operated by Lee and William Bailey, sons of N. J. Bailey, the furniture manufacturer of St. Johns. The Bailey brothers will manufacture only cottonwood veneer and products made from it. One of their principal products will be egg cases. Draw bottoms and other soft wood veneers will be manufactured, it is said.

The new municipal terminal dock at St. Johns is the finest shipping pier on the Pacific coast, in the opinion of H. S. Scott, president of the Trans-Oceanic company, who viewed the pier for the first time last week in company with T. Hirota, managing director of the Ocean Transport company of Kobe, Japan, who was investigating the facilities offered by Portland harbor with a view to the possible establishment of a steamship line from Portland to the Orient.

President Wilson's appearance in Portland Monday was greeted by immense crowds and unbounded enthusiasm. His masterly and inspiring address in the auditorium in the evening was listened attentively to by an overflowing audience. His words carried conviction with them and according to his views none could doubt that the League of Nations is the best thing that could happen to this country, as well as the other countries. The hearing his remarks received clearly demonstrated the fact that this part of the country is in full accord with his views of the Peace League.

Regular hours will hereafter be kept daily by a nurse from the Visiting Nurse association at the local library. Miss Otelia Hendrickson, a graduate nurse with special training in public health nursing, is now giving her entire time to the St. Johns district. Miss Hendrickson may be consulted at the library from 1:30 to 2:30 daily. The services of the visiting nurses are given without charge to the patient whenever the family is unable to pay, but in the majority of cases the patients or members of their family are able to make some payment for services. Plans are under way for the establishment of a babies' clinic, where mothers may receive instruction in hygiene, feeding and other matters, it is said.
