The destroying of the Consolidated Laundry by fire in Portland Monday night caused a number of St. Johns folks to lose their week's wash of clothes, being quite a severe loss in some instances.

A small piece of peanut Wednesday night caused the death of Josie, two-year-old daughter of Mr. and Mrs. John Lammi, of Astoria. The fragment became lodged in the child's windpipe. Efforts of a physician to remove the particle were futile.

The Artisans had a merry time at their masquerade dance Tuesday evening. The attendance was large, the crowd jolly and if a person did not have a good time it was his own fault entirely. It was a splendid success in every way.

One hundred homes in the city of Portland are quarantined for diphtheria. The number of cases is increasing rapidly. Approximately 90 cases under quarantine are either carriers of the disease or persons who have come in contact with the disease.

Dorothy Rude of James John High was one of the winners in the school essay contest on the career of Theodore Roosevelt, in which all the schools of Portland competed. Among the ten receiving honorable mention were Benjamin Eaton of the Central school, Elizabeth Ogden of the East school and Lillian Miller of the North School. Certainly a fine compliment to the literary ability of St. Johns.

The new 9500-ton steamer Waban, which is loading for the orient at the St. Johns terminal, will sail Monday night or Tuesday morning. The Waban already has stowed a considerable quantity of lumber and is taking on 7500 tons of miscellaneous freight. The Wawalona, when she follows the Waban on the berth, will load 8000 tons of freight. After the Waban has sailed and before the Wawalona has finished loading, the steamer Coaxet, which left Kobo for Portland October 12, will come to the St. Johns terminal to discharge a full cargo of hemp and oriental merchandise. Two outward cargos and one inward will be the largest rush of business in the history of the new terminal.

As will be noted in the large announcement elsewhere in this paper the Christian church will open for public service in their new edifice at Oswego street and Central avenue, Sunday, November 2. The new structure is an imposing one, conveniently arranged and splendidly planned. It is an important addition to St. Johns, and Dr. H. F. Jones, the minister, and the congregation have reason to feel proud of this superb achievement. It required indomitable persistence and unflagging zeal to accomplish it, and it was largely through Dr. Jones' untiring energy and optimistic perseverance that it was brought about, and the members worked faithfully, loyally and unceasingly. The result is a handsome and commodious church edifice.
