News in General

Thomas Scales has gone to Long Beach, Cal., to spend the winter.

Miss Olga Johnson, of Montana, and Edward Connant of St. Johns, were married in Vancouver, Wash., Wednesday, of last week. Mr. Connant is proprietor of a shoe repair shop on Jersey street. They have taken up their residence on South Jersey street.

The Woman's Home Missionary society met at the home of Mrs. E. D. Vinson, 528 South Ivanhoe street last Friday afternoon. Mrs. May Cummsky Bliss, national field worker for Methodist church, spoke on Christian Americanization. Mrs. F. N. Sandifer sang. Tea was served.

Clifford B. Holmes and an unidentified man were seriously injured Sunday evening when their motorcycles collided just beyond St. Helens. Mrs. A. S. Benson of 903 South Crawford street, St. Johns, observed the men lying along the road as she passed in an auto. She took Holmes to the Williams avenue hotel, and persons in a car belonging to the Warren Construction company picked up the other man. Holmes is believed to be internally injured.

Extension of the city limits on the peninsula to include water frontage as far east as the Columbia river is proposed by the city docks commission. The city attorney has been asked to draw up a charter amendment to annex this territory, which will add millions of dollars to the taxable property of the city. The amendment will have to be voted upon at the next general election. The territory included in the proposed annexation would take in the property of the Swift Packing Co., and would give Portland almost as long a frontage on the Columbia river as it has on the Willamette.

Kelly Butte is to be operated as sub-jail and rockpile by Multnomah county as soon as bids for supplies are advertised for and a stockade is built, which, according to Roadmaster William Eatchel, will require about twenty days.

A huge bear, its carcass tipping the scales at 302 pounds, was shot by Ross Winans near Dee. The bear, believed to have taken more than twenty sheep from flocks pasturing in the neighborhood last summer and fall, has been placed on sale. It was killed unusually late in the season, these animals normally having "holed in" before this.

A wage of \$41 for a forty-eight-hour week for journeymen compositors was the award announced last week by the arbitration board hearing the case of the Portland commercial printing houses and members of the allied printing trades. The previous wage of these workmen has been \$36 for a forty-eight-hour week. The demand made was for \$42 for a forty-two-hour week. The case has been pending for nearly two months. The controversy arose about the middle of August and was finally referred to an arbitration board in September. Eighteen hearings were held. Apprentices of various grades received varying raises.

The city of Portland and the dock commission, being unable to come to any understanding with the Portland Railway, Light & Power company relative to the proposed extension of the street railway from its present terminus in St. Johns to the municipal terminal, the public service commission is requested to set a date for hearing arguments in the case. Application for the extension was made by the city of Portland on the ground that the same was necessary to the convenience of dock employes living in St. Johns. The railroad company opposed the extension on the grounds that the expense would be justified by the returns. At the hearing in that matter three weeks ago an adjournment was taken, with the understanding that the applicants and the P. R. L. & P. company would get together on a solution of the controversy.

Arrangements are being made for the disposal of all materials in the Astoria shipyards belonging to the Emergency Fleet corporation and all the machinery at the Astoria Marine Iron works will be placed aboard the Emergency Fleet corporation steamer Montezuma and taken to the St. Johns yards for disposition. The bar iron now at the McEachern yards there is being loaded on barge and will be taken to St. Johns about the middle of the week.

News has just been received in this city of the death of Mrs. W. N. Morris, long-time Portland resident, who passed away at the home of her daughter, Mrs. W. J. Quigley, in Yakima, Wash., on November 8. Mrs. Morris, who had been suffering from a stroke of paralysis for some time, had gone to Yakima in the hope of bettering her health. Mrs. Morris came to Portland in 1889, and for a number of years she had been living at the home of her son-in-law and daughter, Mr. and Mrs. W. P. Morin, 924 South Syracuse street, St. Johns Heights. She also leaves one son, Charles E. Morris of Indianapolis, Ind. Funeral services were held at Yakima, Wash. Mrs. Morris was 71 years of age.

The blaze was discovered after it had gained some headway and was burning behind the boiler. R. W. Harper, night watchman, who discovered the fire, summoned the Linnton volunteer department, but its efforts were ineffectual. By the time that engines 22, 6, and 17, were on the scene, the fire was beyond control. A warehouse some distance away was saved. The home of Ed Boucher, next door, was destroyed, with a loss of \$200. The roof on the home of William Fishy nearby was burned off. The factory is owned by J. A. and J. B. Mayes, of the Clifford hotel. The loss is covered by insurance.
