The Minute Men were a class of citizens pledged to take the field at a minute's notice. They were first known during and immediately previous to the War of the Revolution and afterwards at the beginning of the Civil war. Sometimes they were regularly enrolled as Militia.

Holmes Gabert, a salesman employed by the Bushong company, suffered the loss of both legs when he was thrown under the front trucks of the rear car of a two car St. Johns train. The accident happened at Williams avenue and Stanton street at 7:30 o'clock Wednesday morning. According to attendants at St. Vincent's hospital, the young man attempted to swing upon the rear platform of the front car, and missed his hold. He was thrown under the rear car. His left leg was cut off below the knee and it was necessary for surgeons to amputate the right leg, which was badly crushed. Gabert, who is 20 years old, resides at 208 Stanton street, with his mother and sister. He has been employed at the Bushong company since he returned from France a year ago.

"It isn't what we earn, but what we spend, that keeps us poor," is the brief summing up of the Thrift week philosophy advanced by John N. Edelsen, cashier of the Peninsula National Bank. To aid the government in its thrift campaign, the Peninsula National is distributing a family budget and household account book, free of charge to its patrons as long as the supply lasts. The book is conveniently arranged to cover a year's accounting, and covers every ordinary avenue of household expense. Of equal importance are suggested budgets based on varying incomes from \$600 to \$2400 annually. The amounts allotted for various items of living expense were supplied by the Oregon Agricultural college. On income of \$2400 per year it is suggested that a family of two adults and three children should spend \$450 for food, \$408 for shelter, \$312 for clothing, \$400 for operating expenses, such as laundry, fuel, light, water, help, house furnishings, etc., \$200 for insurance, church and club dues, charity, services of physician and dentist and recreation; \$600 for education, books, magazines, newspapers and savings. The amounts suggested in the proposed budgets are tentative and must vary to fit particular needs, but the habit of placing household expenses on a budget basis is recommended by the officials of the Peninsula National Bank as a sure method of increasing savings and getting the most out of an income.—Journal.
