One afternoon, during a lull in the bathing demands of a certain trans-Atlantic liner, George, the youth who had charge of the ball rooms used by the saloon passengers, decided to take a bath, so he locked himself in one of the rooms used by the men. Suddenly he was disturbed by a rap at the door, and heard a woman's voice: "Honey! Honey! Are you there?" No reply coming from the room the lady spoke again: "Honey! Are you there?" As an explanation was needed, George spoke: "Beg your pardon, lady, but this ain't no beehive; this is a bathroom."

Eight complete houses a day can be turned out from the new mill of the Aladdin Company, just completed in the Peninsula industrial district. The company has been operating its smaller mill and cut up plant for the past two months. The plant now employs 250 men. The company has sufficient acreage to build two more plants the size of the new mill, 108 by 350 feet, and expects to so increase its capacity as business develops. A. A. Patterson, general manager of the Pacific Coast plant here, states that the Aladdin Company is receiving thousands of inquiries from the Orient and expects soon to be sending its ready-cut houses to China, Japan, the Philippines and Hawaii. Exportation of bungalows to South America has already started.

At the request of the Navy Department I have this day issued the following proclamation calling for five hundred recruits to fill vacancies on board "Uncle Sams" fighting ships; the United States Government has asked the State of Oregon for five hundred good clean young men for the months of July and August to help fill the vacancies in the Navy caused by the granting of discharges to men who enlisted only for the duration of the war. The Congress of the United States has recently seen fit to increase the pay of all ranks and ratings of the Navy to bring the compensation of men in the service to a par with that of those in other occupations. Our Navy, often termed the Nation's first line of defense, is recognized here as elsewhere as of the utmost importance, and it must be kept up to the full standard of its strength. To its enlisted personnel the United States Navy offers fair treatment, and opportunity for education, wholesome recreation, interesting and instructing travel, and a general atmosphere of right living and right thinking. The Navy provides a training that any young man will find of marked value throughout his lifetime. I therefore respectfully ask that the people of the State of Oregon cooperate with the Navy in securing its enlisted quota and that the young men of our state give to the Navy their serious consideration. — Ben W. Oleott, Governor of Oregon.
