D. E. Godfrey died at his home, 705 Charleston street, on Thursday, August 5th, aged 74 years. He was the husband of Mrs. Adelia Godfrey, father of Mrs. Chas. Dezell of Spokane, and Mrs. Bert Mayson of Ione, Oregon. The funeral services were held Sunday at 2:30 p. m. at Chambers Undertaking Co., 248-250 Killingsworth avenue, under the auspices of General Compton Post G. A. R. and W. R. C. Concluding services were held at the Portland crematorium by Dorie Lodge, A. F. & A. M.

While cutting hay on his farm Fred Lockwood, a rancher near Eugene, cut off both feet of his 3 year old daughter, who was playing in the tall oats. The little girl was not seen by her father until an instant before the sickle hit her. Mr. Lockwood's two children had been playing about the barn, where he was getting the mower ready to cut hay. As he drove into the field he did not see them and thought they had gone to the house. In the first round he suddenly came upon the little girl but was unable to stop the horses until too late. A surgeon attended the child's injuries and she was taken to Florence, where she is said to be recovering.

Mrs. Geo. W. Muhm was found dead at her home, 108 Smith avenue, when her husband returned from work Tuesday afternoon near 5 o'clock. The kitchen where she was lying was filled with gas. The coroner's verdict, we understand, was accident or suicide, undetermined. Mrs. Muhm had been in ill health since she underwent an operation about one year ago. Her death was a matter of keen regret to her numerous friends, and a great shock to the husband and little daughter, Vivian, who survive. Mrs. Muhm, who was the daughter of Mrs. Laura Armstrong, 530 East Mohawk street, was well liked by all who knew her. The funeral takes place this Friday, afternoon at 2:30, from Finley's undertaking parlors.

Dr. T. L. Perkins, who was unanimously endorsed by the United Spanish War Veterans last week as a candidate for City Commissioner, has been a member of the upper house of the State Legislature in the 1913 and 1915 sessions, at which time he was chairman of the ways and means committee and the assessment taxation committee.
