The St. Johns Community Club will meet Tuesday evening, September 21st, at the club rooms of the Portland Woolen Mills. This will be the first meeting of the club since the vacation period, and promises to be an unusually interesting one. Commissioner Pier and members of the school board on the committee for selection of a high school site will be invited. Lunch will be served and a number of matters of importance taken up. We understand that Miss Caples is willing to make quite a concession in price for high school purposes.

It was announced that a section had been reserved for the Cox-Roosevelt Club of St. Johns at the Auditorium next Monday noon, when Governor Cox will speak.

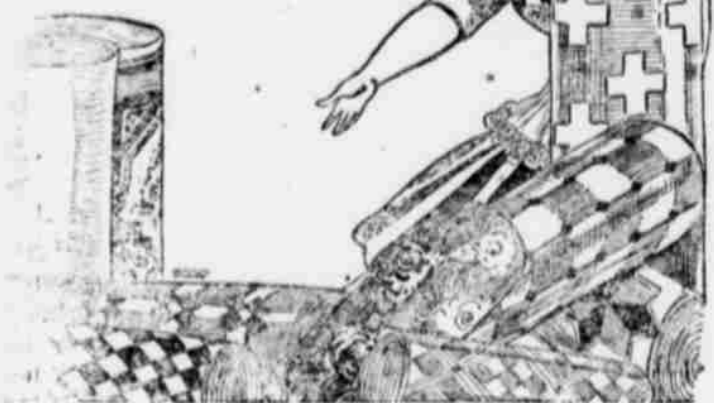
