A man named Reed was arrested for attacking Miss Murna Beaver at her home on South Leonard street Sunday evening, October 10th. The man, presuming that she was in the home alone, entered the house through a bedroom window and grabbed the girl by the throat. She succeeded in breaking his hold and called for help. Her parents, a sleep in another part of the house, were awakened and came to her rescue, and Mr. Beaver, accompanied by Mr. Waters, a neighbor, captured the man and took him to the police station, where he was locked up. Murna is about 14 years of age, and was unacquainted with her assailant but it was learned that a strange man had been seen around that neighborhood some time previously. Miss Beaver suffered painful injuries to the throat which she received in breaking away from her assailant.

The net result of the compromise over the port bill is an agreement that, in its practical operation, it shall be confined to two objects, viz: 1. Port consolidation, 2. Channel improvement. The so-called Swar Island improvement, so far as it involves purchase of lands, their use for deposit of the spoils of dredging, and their subsequent re-sale by private owners, is postponed for referendum to people of the port district. But the great enterprise of river and harbor improvement must proceed. Defeat of the proposed measure would have retarded and even injured seriously, this most essential work. Proponents and opponents of the measure alike realize that, in the emergency, common ground must be found; and it was found. Let the people of the state take notice, Portland is practically united for the port consolidation measure. Let them govern themselves accordingly and vote 310 yes; and let the people of the city vote 510 yes; on the local measure to transfer docks to the port.—Oregonian.

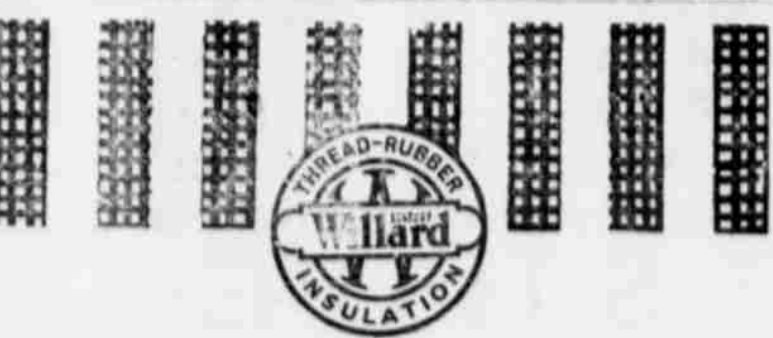

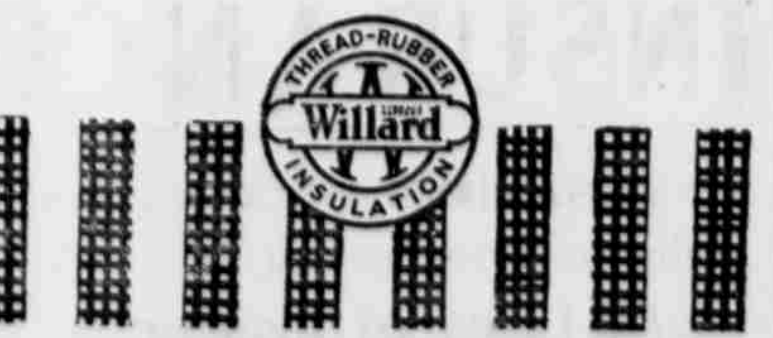

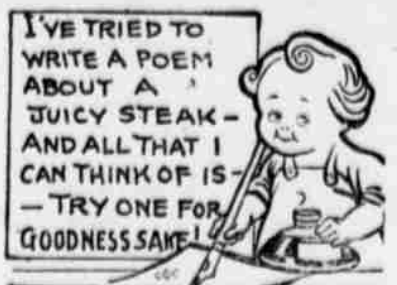
