

ST. JOHNS REVIEW

The police force reporting at the St. Johns station to Sergeant R. L. Crane numbers 16. The territory covered embraces all of the St. Johns district and the Peninsula section bounded by Killingsworth avenue on the south and west of Albina avenue. In addition west of the river is Linnton, Oiltown and Whitwood Court. The officers are George Adams, G. A. Roberts, C. B. Maxwell, F. B. Anderson, C. E. Dalrymple, J. H. Black, F. L. Hatt, C. C. Brown, P. J. Pierre, R. Sperry, P. G. Belieu, J. Burre, C. L. Miller, G. E. Richards, W. Fisher, W. W. Gallaher. When St. Johns was taken over by the city of Portland over five years ago Officers G. A. Roberts, F. B. Anderson and F. L. Hatt were assigned to the station. They are still on their beats and known to every man, woman and child as a friend and adviser. The policy of the force has always been to make friends, prevent misdemeanors and crimes, settle neighborhood differences quietly and out of court when possible, but when necessary to put duty before everything else.

J. H. Black of the St. Johns police station is a patrolman of marked abilities as a carpenter and cabinetmaker. He has been putting in considerable time, when not performing his regular duties as property-man, in fixing up the newly arranged quarters of the station, which is the former city hall. He has made it so attractive and convenient that there is some fear expressed that the Portland city council may be tempted to move its place of meeting to St. Johns and turn the police and firemen out into the cold.

Motor vehicle owners who have not applied for their 1921 licenses are urged by the Secretary of State to do so at once in order to avoid congestion in the Department around the first of the coming year and also that they may avoid arrest by the peace officers for failure to carry 1921 license plates after January first. The law will be rigidly enforced by the inspectors of the department. There are now over 103,000 licensed cars in Oregon. To this time about 9,000 applications for 1921 licenses have been received. The facilities of the department are limited and unless the work involved in issuing licenses is distributed over a reasonable period car owners cannot expect to receive their license plates promptly. By delay they are improving their chances for arrest for failure to have their 1921 licenses by January 1, 1921. About October 1st blanks were forwarded to all the owners of motor vehicles for applying for 1921 licenses. If any of them failed to receive blanks it has been by reason of change of residence not reported to the office or failure of the mails. Application blanks may be secured of your chief of police or marshal, city or town recorder, sheriff, county clerk and the licensed motor vehicle dealers in your locality, or by request of the Secretary of State, Salem, Ore.

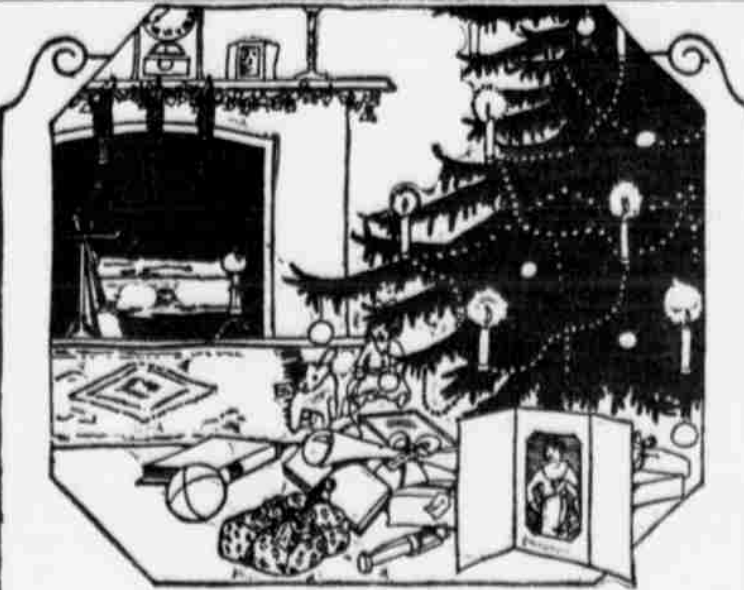
