To the institutions, business men and factories as a whole, both on the West side and East side of the river, be it understood: That the citizens and taxpayers of St. Johns who are living here and spending their money paying taxes and supporting families, and are leaving practically every dollar they earn in St. Johns, spending it with the merchants and banks and loan company of this place. We, for one concern, must and will insist upon the employers to show at least a percentage of leniency in this direction, in preference to those that happen to drift in from other parts, especially give the preference to the men of families and taxpayers, single or married. This is only reasonable and just to the citizens of St. Johns. You may say this is the excuse. Say, for instance, Clark & Wilson or Terminal No. 4 wanted or needed 15 to 40 men. The excuse is, well, we have not the time to run around St. Johns to look up men, but we can phone over to Portland to some employment bureau and have our men here in 30 to 40 minutes. Right here I want to say that this will not be an excuse any longer, for we are centering upon the fact that on account of such conditions heretofore it has been very difficult to get laborers probably just when needed. But we as one concern will agree to see that all such stumbling blocks will be removed, and will say this: We as business men and banks of St. Johns and community as a whole, hope to eliminate all such difficulty in not getting ready help as you may require by opening up a labor bureau by taking the necessary steps to supply all employers' needs hereafter, and will say we would like to hear from the community of St. Johns if they would approve of such a step as this to better conditions of our citizens. We would be glad to hear from any one if this would appeal to your opinion along these lines, as we propose to take up this matter in a businesslike manner by taking it up with the city officials in the right course.—Hartford & Shackleton, Greater St. Johns Realty Co., 403 N.
