Portland's Rose Festival

The 1921 Floral Parade of Portland Rose Festival is to be a Great Community Pageant that will so attract the attention of the Motion Picture World, the Magazine Writers and the Press Associations that the story of the Parade of a Million Roses. The 1921 Rose Festival Board has been organized and President Otto W. Mielke has appointed Henry W. Kent Executive Secretary of the Portland Service League, as Chairman of the Floral Parade Committee. Mr. Kent has named the 6000 officers of the League as his associates on this committee which means a successful parade. Detail plans will be given at an early date.

Every boy and girl in Portland will be asked to plant a Rose Festival Garden. Special prizes on seeds, plants and bulbs will be given by the public spirited dealers and seed growers through the officers of the League, to all of the boys and girl Garden Growers. Some of the big hearted citizens who have no children of their own are adopting one of the neighbor's children for the purpose of getting interest in this splendid endeavor.

Three boys and girls in each group of ten neighbors, approximately, will be given first, second and third prizes for the three best Gardens. This will mean that about 36 boys and girls will ride in the Precinct Cars that are to be decorated by the people of the precinct with flowers grown in the precinct by the boys and girls of the precinct. Assistance of the men and women of the precinct will be permitted, but on a score of points the boy or girl who does all of the work will gain in points. This week's message is: "Plant Sweet Peas at once and in order to be sure to get them to bloom by June 8th." Mr. Ray Gill, the chairman of the Seed Committee, gives the following directions: Dig a trench 18 inches deep, smash up a dozen old cans, throw in a mixture of six inches of soil. On top of this lay six inches of horse manure or straw. On top of this two inches sifted dirt sprinkled with fertilizing mixture, rake in then another two inches dirt sprinkled with the fertilizer and continue this process until the mixed soil is about 3 inches above the level. Plant the Sweet Peas about one inch below the surface. The Peas should be soaked in lukewarm water over night, not longer, in order to hasten growth. This rule is for a trench about 15 feet in length. Plant in warm spot. Owing to the time being short this advice must be followed if we are to have blooms by June 8th.

All rose bushes should be carefully pruned, fertilized and sprayed promptly. Save your cuttings and plant them in the garden for future use. Call on Major T. J. Monahan, Col. 224, or his Adjutant, D. H. Knowles, Col. 161, for further information.
