Death of Mrs. Deese

Mrs. W. C. Deese died at her home, 424 E. Mohawk street, June 3d at 11 p. m. She had been in poor health for about a year. Maggie McMurren, daughter of John and Sarah McMurren, was born in Iowa in 1863, and crossed the plains with her parents in 1865 when 12 years of age. She settled in Washington county, Oregon, and resided there the earlier part of her life. When 17 years old she was united in marriage with Ed. Albee, to which union six boys were born, all of whom are living except one, who died in 1913. In 1902 she married W. C. Deese, who survives her. She also leaves four brothers and four sisters. The deceased was the fifth of a family of twelve children, three dying in babyhood days. She is the first to be called in 69 years. The funeral services were held at the chapel of the St. Johns Undertaking Co. June 6th; interment in River-view cemetery.

The deceased wrote the following some time before her death:
In eighteen hundred and seventy-four
A bright little stranger appeared at my door;
A dear little stranger, a son and an heir
Demanding of me a mother's fond care.
I nestled it close to my young mother
heart,
Never, never once thinking we ever
must part.

Virtually everything in the world owned by James Riggs, 1700 Willamette boulevard, was swept away late Saturday afternoon when fire destroyed his home and endangered the lives of his invalid wife and six small children who narrowly escaped from the flames. Mrs. Riggs was in bed on the second story of the same house. She was unable to carry the youngest girl, three years old, and was forced to roll the child before her, hurrying it down the stairway as the smoke and flames spread rapidly through the upper rooms. The fire started in the kitchen, when a nine-year-old daughter, Ollie, attempted to start a fire in the range. Grease spilled from a skillet and spread over the stove and floor, flaring up and causing a small explosion. The child dashed from the room, screaming a warning to other members of the family. A pet fox terrier was cremated in the flames when it became alarmed by the smoke and could not find an exit. Engine company 32 responded to a fire alarm turned in by neighbors, but the fire had too much headway to be checked. The house was a complete loss, only the shell of the charred wall remaining. The loss, estimated by the fire department, was placed at \$2500 to house and contents. The house is owned by John Crouch and is covered by insurance. Riggs, who is a teamster for the Peninsula Lumber company, had only recently moved into the house and carried no insurance on the furnishings. One hundred and ten dollars in bills, which were under Mrs. Riggs' pillow was destroyed.

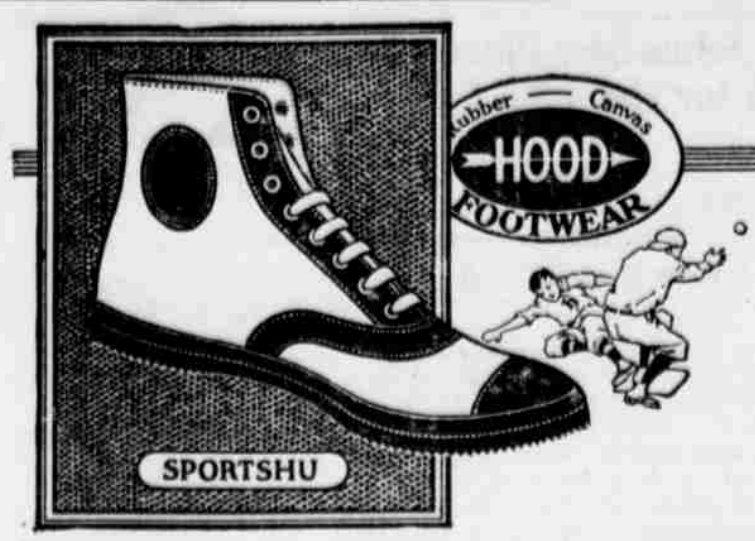
