Charles F. Lidberg died at his home, 411 Allegheny street, Thursday at 2:15 p. m., June 2nd. He was born in Gottenberg, Sweden, in 1842, hence was 79 years of age. He came to America about 40 years ago, and for the past 18 years has resided in St. Johns. He was a member of the Christian church and well liked by all who knew him. Surviving him are his widow and five children, viz: Mrs. Clara Ressel, Mrs. Agnes Josephson, Mrs. Maude Lindquist, C. J. Lidberg and Fred T. Lidberg. The funeral services were held Saturday at 1 p. m., Dr. H. F. Jones preaching the sermon. Miller & Tracy had charge of the remains. Interment in Mt. Scott cemetery.

The long felt need of a hospital in this portion of the city has at last been relieved. A fine little institution, to be called the Peninsula General Hospital, opened this week on what was formerly known as the Chipman property, corner Williamette boulevard and Trumbull street. The location itself is ideal, quiet, overlooking the river and close to the car line, yet far enough to be free from the disturbance of traffic. The hospital will accommodate about 20, is fully equipped with an up-to-date surgery and a special department for maternity work. As fine an X-Ray equipment as is in the city is now being installed, to be operated by Dr. Frederick R. Deemer. The hospital is under the management of Mrs. Beno, with a competent staff of nurses, and is open to all doctors. The management invites the inspection of the general public on Sunday and Monday, July 3rd and 4th, between the hours of 2 and 4 p. m.

Dr. Sullins, general secretary of the Congregational churches of Oregon, has been for several months endeavoring to secure for the St. Johns Congregational church a minister of worth and ability and consecrated to the cause of the uplift of humanity and the Christ-like living and be a power for good in this community. Realizing that St. Johns is destined to become a great industrial and commercial center and asset of Portland with its great dockage, railway and terminal facilities, Dr. Sullins has been corresponding with a number of men all over the United States. Mr. Clark, formerly of Minneapolis, Minn., twice called to one of the largest churches in that city, compelled to resign and rest for his health, preached at the Congregational church on June 10th. Rev. B. E. Nourse, from Southern Colorado will have charge of the services next Sunday, July 2, at 11 a. m. and 7:45 p. m. Dr. Nourse has been very successful in his ministry. We would like to see all the membership and those who are not regularly attending anywhere else to hear him.—Reported.

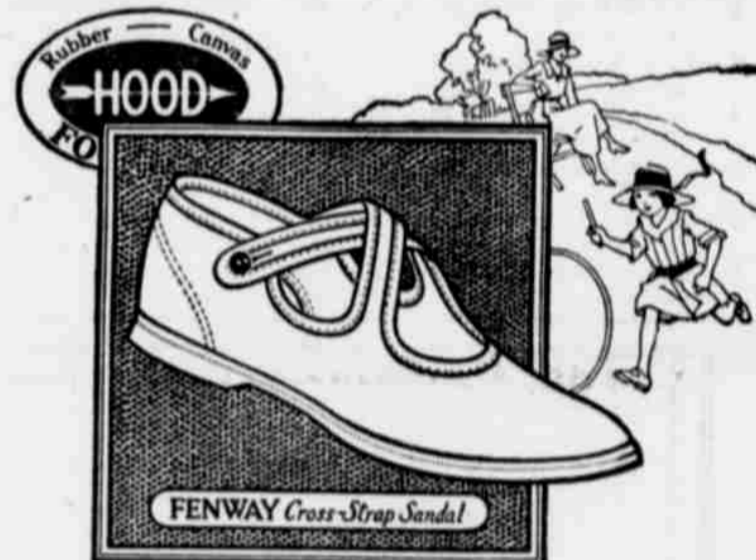
**ENTERTAINMENT**
