A Pleasing Entertainment

The entertainment given by the employees of the Pacific Telephone and Telegraph Company Tuesday evening at the Y. W. C. A. auditorium under the auspices of the St. Johns Community Club was an enjoyable affair. It was instructive as well as entertaining and interesting. A well shown moving picture of the telephone line from the period of cutting the brush in the wilds, digging holes for the poles, placing of same and stringing the wires, on through the various processes until the line reaches the big cities through underground conduits, and thus serving the world were depicted in interesting detail. Another picture demonstrated the convenience of the telephone in time of fire, burglary and illness, besides the various devices used in perfecting the system.

L. T. Betz, salesman in the commercial department, gave an interesting talk in which he gave a brief history of the telephone service in Portland, stating the first long distance line was constructed to St. Johns and a charge of 25 cents was made. He impressed upon his hearers the importance of cooperation between the patron and Central in securing the highest degree of service, and told of the convenience of the telephone, especially in case of quarantine.

Another interesting and instructive feature was the switch board demonstration, "What Happens When You Lift Up the Receiver," presented by five young ladies. This gave an excellent idea of how phone calls are received and taken care of.

Pleasing numbers that were heartily enjoyed were: Instrumental quartet, selections by Telephone Mixed Quartet, selections by Telephone Jazz Orchestra, baritone solo by Mark Daniels, and a minstrel team, black face, amused the audience. That there are some especially fine singers and musicians among the employees was fully demonstrated. The evening was thoroughly enjoyed by the large audience in attendance.
