Mr. Roche of the St. Johns Auto Electric Co. offers a few suggestions as to the care of your battery during the cold weather. As a battery discharges, says Mr. Roche, more and more of the acids is drawn into the plates, consequently the proportion of water in the solution will increase. Water freezes at 32 degrees Fahrenheit and an entirely discharged battery left exposed to the cold will freeze a little below 32 degrees. A frozen battery is seldom worth repairing. If you put water in the cells during the cold weather be sure to allow the motor to run 30 minutes or so in order to mix the water with the acid already in the cells, eliminating the possibility of the water freezing and cracking the jars if left on top of the solution.

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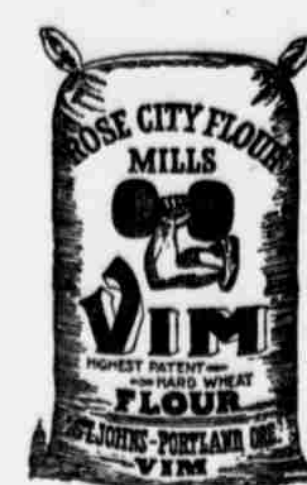
