A new feature of the income tax law requires that every person who had a gross income of \$5,000 or more for 1921 must file a return, regardless of whether or not that sum yielded him a cent of profit. To illustrate: A received from his business and other sources \$5,000 during the year 1921, but his deductible expenses for the year aggregated \$4,500. His net income being less than \$1,000, A would not have to pay an income tax. However, he is required under the law to file an income tax return if his gross income was \$5,000 or more regardless of whether or not he realizes any profit. These returns must be filed in the office of Clyde G. Huntley, Collector of Internal Revenue, not later than March 15th, 1922.


