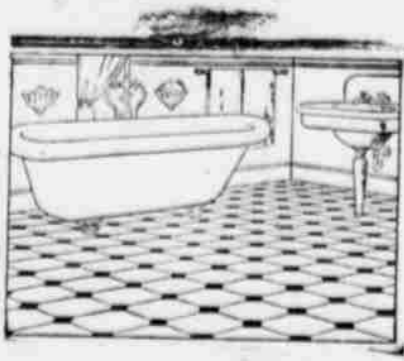

Hourly service must be maintained between 6 A. M. and 6:30 P. M. and three round trips must be made between 6:30 P. M. and 11 P. M. A 15 cent fare is the maximum with a requirement that 100 tickets must be sold for \$10.00.

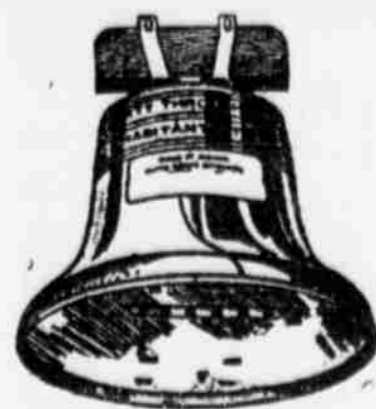
