Indoor lightning is the latest achievement of Dr. Charles P. Steinmetz, the electrical genius of Schenectady, N. Y., who now, that he can make lightning of his own, and experiment with it, hopes to evolve greater protecting devices for electrical transmission lines and buildings. Daily experiments with indoor thunder storms are now being conducted, a voltage of 120,000 volts being employed, which represents in its brief flash more than a million horse power. A strong lightning flash has been estimated by Dr. Steinmetz at 50,000,000 volts. There is the same flash and noise, though modified—and the laboratory lightning makes the same sort of a mess of a block of wood that nature's lightning does to a good sized tree.

In the justice court at Walla Walla a moonshiner came up for sentence and was fined \$250, in addition to which the judge consigned him to the county jail for a period of two months. That judge has the correct antidote for bootlegging and moonshining. A small or moderate fine will not deter a lawbreaker, but a jail sentence will do the work.—Pendleton East Oregonian.
