St. Johns Community Club

The Community Club meeting held in the Y. W. C. A. building Tuesday evening was attended by a goodly number. An especially interesting feature of the evening was a radio entertainment put on by radio experts of the Northwestern Electric Co., which courtesy on the part of the company was highly appreciated, and expressed in a rising vote of thanks. Besides the Hawley concert, which was received by the radio outfit that was installed for the purpose, definite instruction was given, illustrated further by printed designs distributed throughout the audience for making of receiving outfits at home. It was through the cooperation of Dow V. Walker that the entertainment was given. The outcome of the visitation will in all probability be the organization of a boys' and girls' radio club, which will be under the supervision of Lieut. Crane and Dr. McCall. Definite arrangements will be completed in the near future for these organizations. For the purpose of encouraging such a project, Mr. Walker announced that the Northwestern Electric Co. will donate \$50 toward installing radio apparatus. The members of the proposed club will be given instruction how to construct and get the best results from radio outfits.

Prior to the radio entertainment a short business meeting was held, presided over by President Monahan. A communication from Commissioner Barbur stated that engineers would be sent to work out some method of taking care of the gravel pit near Pier Park. The membership committee planned more active campaign for new members. Mr. Monahan urged that goodly delegation attend the school meeting Wednesday night, when the naming of the new high school would probably take place, and he voiced unalterable objection to a proposition of taking the name James John High and placing it upon the new building. J. B. Huntington also expressed strong disapproval of such move, and pointed out a danger of the school board losing the present James John property if such a transfer in name was effected. He said from a close study of the behests of James John he had found that the present site of the James John High was not particularly high school purposes.

Prof. Fletcher extended an invitation to the club to meet at the James John High building on Wednesday evening, May 24th, when a dinner would be served and entertainment provided. The invitation was accepted.

To Celebrate Golden Wedding

Mr. and Mrs. T. J. Monahan will celebrate their golden wedding on Friday, May 12th. This estimable couple were married at Alantus Grove, Gentry county, Missouri, May 12th, 1872, by Rev. Lemuel Watkins, pastor of the Christian church. September 22, 1881, they left Stanberry, Mo., for Portland, Oregon, arriving in this city October 5th, 1881. The following month they went to Toledo, Wash., and remained for the winter, coming back to St. Johns in May, 1882, when Mr. Monahan went to work for the Oregon Barrel Co., of which B. O. Severance was superintendent. For the past forty years they have been prominently identified with the progress and development of this section. Upon this anniversary occasion open house will be kept during the afternoon and evening for all their friends, and to which all are most cordially invited. A special invitation is extended to members of the Community Club.

Dr. Earl Goode died at the residence of his parents, Rev. and Mrs. John A. Goode, 7412 Fifty-fifth avenue, aged 27 years. He was a former resident of St. Johns while his father was pastor of the Evangelical church. When he was born he was enlisted and was soon at the front. Since his injury caused by being gassed he had been a victim of lingering illness. He was a member of the state legislature in 1917, being one of the youngest men ever elected to such a position in Oregon. Rev. C. P. Gates preached the funeral sermon.
