The recently organized St. Johns base ball team composed of local players, made good with a vengeance by winning its first two games on the Pier Park diamond, defeating Irvington 12-10 on Sunday and the Fremont Athletic club 7-4 on Memorial Day. In the first game Irvington managed to amass a 10-2 lead before the local boys had time to try out the talent on hand and form a winning combination. With airtight fielding and pitching St. Johns fought an uphill game and forged to the front in the eighth when a slugging rally drove the Irvington hurler from the mound. Larsen twirled a good game, yielding 4 hits and striking out 18 men. Errors in the early innings were responsible for the visitors' runs. "Smoky" Mueller showed the same old stuff that made him the pitching "Ace" of the Interscholastic League when he let the Fremont Athletic club down with 2 hits and turned 20 men back via the strikeout route. He was master of the situation at all times and proved an unsolvable puzzle to the Fremont team. Such brilliant twirling was needed to offset the effective hurling of Jeff Smith, the visitors' moundsman, who ran "Smoky" a close second in pitching honors. "Spud" Surber broke up the game in the 7th inning with a double that emptied the sacks. These two games were arranged to try out the metal of the local men. It is now definitely proven that the St. Johns team is capable of holding its own with any semi-pro team in the city and is worthy of representing the home town. A game will be played at Pier Park Sunday next at 2:30 p. m. The opposing team is not known as this paper goes to press, but a game has been booked. The St. Johns team has been greatly strengthened by the addition of new men and will be outfitted in suits for Sunday's game. Henry Jower and Barrett will add strength to the infield, and an ex-Pacific Coast Leaguer is signed as battery mate to "Smoky" Mueller. A hard hitting outfielder has been secured to afford offensive strength.—"Seibe."
