Buildings under way or contemplated in Portland: Seven new school buildings and additions to others contemplated; total cost \$4,000,000. Ambassador apartments, nearing completion, cost \$650,000. Sovereign apartment hotel; work under way; cost \$500,000. Extension to Pittock block, contemplated, cost \$500,000. Elks' Temple, under way, cost \$1,000,000. Meier & Frank warehouse, started, cost \$300,000. Meier & Frank garage, started, cost \$100,000. Odd Fellows' building, started, cost \$200,000. East wing of Good Samaritan hospital, nearing completion, cost \$200,000. Extension of Emanuel hospital, contemplated, cost \$350,000. Kirkpatrick building, nearing completion, cost \$125,000. Scottish Rite temple, proposed, cost \$1,500,000. Shriners' hospital, to be started shortly, cost \$250,000. Columbia Tire corporation building, started, cost \$250,000. J. K. Gill building, under way, cost \$600,000.

Cheeks aggregating many thousands of dollars were sent out on July 1st by the Portland Railway, Light & Power Company in payment of the second quarterly dividend on its present issue of 7 per cent Prior Preference Stock which it has been offering to its employees, customers and patrons under the "customer ownership" plan since the first of the year. Virtually all of this money is being paid out to persons who have purchased these shares here in Portland and the other forty communities in the territory in which the company operates. The local traction company has been making one of the finest records in the country in the disposition of its securities since the campaign was started last January. A total of 2746 new shareholders have been added since then, their aggregate purchases amounting to \$648,000. This particular issue has proved an attractive one for the reason that the rates on money have been gradually receding and this investment yields 7.3 per cent to the purchaser on the present selling price of \$96 per share, par value \$100. Practically all new public utility securities of this class now being put on the market have an earning power of less than seven per cent.
