Portland must have more bridges across the Willamette river if it is to fulfill its destiny as a great city. With two-thirds of the city's population residing east of the river, and with only five bridges—not a single new one having been built in the past 10 years—nothing else but serious traffic congestion at the bridges could be expected. The time must come when bridges must be erected both north and south of the present structures, and the sooner they are constructed the better for the development of the whole city. Portland and Multnomah county as a whole will vote on November 7th on the proposal to authorize bonds for construction of the Ross Island bridge. This bridge would give a direct route to and from the west side for a great volume of vehicular traffic of the central east side and the southeast section of the city. It would give relief to traffic congestion on the Morrison and Hawthorne bridge, and would be advantageous to the city as a whole. The time will come when St. Johns will be asking the voters of other sections of the city to support its bridge measure, and the joint bridge committee in charge of the Ross Island bridge campaign, urges that support should be given it by this district and that there be reciprocity when the St. Johns bridge measure goes before the people.—Contributed.

A favorable vote on the three mill tax measure for general municipal purposes is urged by the members of the tax supervision and conservation commission. It was this same body that recommended the resubmission of the measure in order that a technical point be cleared up. But the same members declare that the city cannot be operated without the use of this special levy at the present time without curtailments that would spell disaster to the city of Portland. The three mill levy was authorized twice before and is not a new nor an additional tax. The 1923 city budget has been cut to the "very bone" by the city council and the tax commission that has the authority to make any reductions it sees fit, will have the budget for its action after the election. Inasmuch as the tax commission is sworn to curtail any and all activities that are not deemed necessary, the public has a double protection. But a vote against the three mill tax will not result in savings, say the tax commissioners; it will result in disaster.

The parents of the Whitney Boys' Chorus of St. Johns gave the boys a very pleasant evening last Monday at the high school. The beginning of the evening started with drilling, marching and various exercises for the boys, and many of the parents said it was the best thing they ever saw, and said they never knew what their boys were really taught on Monday evenings. After the exercises a short time was taken up with singing, and if you were not there you missed some thing. After the short rehearsal a very pleasant time was had by all. About 150 plates were served with sandwiches, cakes and cocoa, etc., which was arranged for by some of the parents. Be there next Monday, and if you have any boys bring them along.—Reported.

The Bridge Emergency

The people of Multnomah county are confronted with the serious problem of traffic congestion and loss of the present bridges spanning the Willamette.

Four years ago 36,000 vehicles crossed our bridges daily, while now 67,000 vehicles cross each day and our bridges are rapidly becoming useless under the very heavy and rapidly increasing traffic they were not designed to meet.

We Must Have New Bridges

Over two years will elapse before new bridges can be built if approved at the coming election. What will the increasing problem of traffic mean at that time?

Owing to it's central and natural location, **the Burnside Bridge must be rebuilt.** The old bridge has about outlived its usefulness and we must rebuild our most used, and centrally located bridge.

The new bridge is ninety feet in width, with sufficient height and ample approaches, and is designed to meet our great problem of traffic congestion.
