Mrs. Goff is a vocal teacher and choir leader from Oklahoma City and at present is an instructor at the James John night school. She has done musical work in several other leading cities of the U. S. Addressing the Williams Parent Teacher Association on Monday afternoon on Good Books, Miss Florence Gould, children's librarian of St. Johns emphasized the importance of selecting only the best books for the children and gave the following rules by which a good book may be judged: Is the book written in good English? Is it simple and sincere? Is it about a real hero or a dummy, artificial in his virtues; one who does the impossible? Does the moral lesson show too vividly? The ethical line should be gentle and spring unconsciously from the writer's mind. Does it emphasize honesty, truth, courage, self sacrifice without hope of reward? Avoid books which emphasize riches, beauty and beautiful clothes. Avoid unhappy love affairs and books that run in series, and above all avoid the sensational.

A short business meeting preceded the talk by Miss Gould. Report of the committee in charge of the milk now being distributed showed that during the four weeks the school has used more than 4000 half pints of milk and of that amount only \$10 was free milk. The treasurer reported a total of \$239 made at the recent entertainment at James John high school for that fund.
