### PIONEER METHODIST CHURCH DEDICATED

With the impressive Methodist Episcopal ceremony, Pioneer Methodist church of St. Johns was dedicated on Sunday morning following a sermon by resident bishop, William O. Shepard.

Bishop Shepard chose for his text the simple words of Jesus found in Luke 10—"And thy neighbor as thyself." These simple words spoken over 2000 years ago are just being recognized, he said. We are coming to see that the world is only a "whole neighborhood" and regardless of religion, politics, nationality or color we must do unto others as we would that they would do unto us and thy neighbor as thyself. The man who showed himself kindly recognized the mutual obligation of neighborliness.

The matter with the world today is that Christianity has failed, I failed, you failed, the newspapers, the statesmen, the teachers, the schools, the courts, literature, everything failed to heed the simple teachings of Jesus, "Thy neighbor as thyself."

What makes a miserable world are ignorance, selfishness, astrology and manias—if we should stop relief everywhere—if we should have a friendless church. What the world needs is a kindly spirit and the Christmas of 1922 is experiencing more kindly deeds than ever before. The world is producing more Good Samaritans, he said, citing the recent fire in Astoria with the train loads of supplies, and with the thousands of dollars offered for immediate relief of the sufferers.

"And this beautiful church," he said, "must not be filled with beautiful music, with silver-tongued orators nor with mighty preachers, but with just neighborliness born of love of God—with just kindness by everyone that enters and with friendliness. Put away selfishness and have the spirit of Christ when he said 'thy neighbor as thyself.'"

It is not "my rights" in this new world but my privilege, my duty, my opportunity. It is not "I am as good as you are" but "you are as good as I am."

Proceeding the sermon the program included a prelude, "Romance," by Mrs. B. A. Olson; hymn, "All Hail the Power of Jesus' Name"; Invocation, Dr. Frank N. Sandifur; solo, "Prayer Perfect," Miss Lola Murphy accompanied on the piano by Mrs. Bernice McCall; violin solo, "The Holy City," Miss Grace Taffa with Mrs. Olson as accompanist; solo, "Seek Ye the Lord," J. Grant McGinnis with the choir.

Assisting in the dedication were H. F. Clark, who presented the key; D. Talman, E. E. Brimmer, Thomas Skells, William Gallo-way, C. W. Mason.

Pre-dedicatory services were held on Friday evening which was a reception. On this program were solos by Mrs. Eva L. Abbott, and an address by Rev. Chas. W. MacCaughy.


On Saturday evening former pastors, Rev. J. J. Patten, Rev. J. H. Irvine and Rev. F. N. Sandifur, conducted echo services.

Sunday evening, Rev. W. W. Youngson, district superintendent, preached the sermon. The musical program included numbers by the Junior and Adult choir and solo by J. Grant McGinnis.

The identity of the mysterious old woman with the 100 pockets who made her appearance at the entertainment sponsored by the W. C. T. U. in the Y. W. C. A. on Wednesday evening remained a secret throughout the sale of the contents of the pockets. Mrs. G. E.
