In 1883 they moved to Watertown, South Dakota where they resided until coming to St. Johns in 1906. Mr. and Mrs. Sellick celebrated their golden wedding anniversary on December 22, 1920. Surviving him besides his widow, Carrie Sellick, are his daughter, Mrs. T. H. Skells,
