The memoir documents my time working that district, and the difficulties I had trying to do good police work against tremendous odds, as well as the toll it took on me personally. The stories are both funny (because funny things do happen to cops,) and sad and tragic at the same time, because more than anything, a police officer will see the very worst in human behavior possible.
