Warming Shelter Moves to University Park United Methodist

he winter warming shelter for people who are houseless has moved to University Park United Methodist church at 4775 N. Lombard near Lombard and Fiske in the Portsmouth neighborhood. The warming shelter will be open from 8pm to 8am anytime temperatures at night reach freezing, 32 degrees. This is the shelter's third year under the leadership of AllOne Services, a non-profit organized by an unusual alliance of 20 Christian churches in north Portland called Church of North Portland (churchofnorthportland.org). "We realized that individually none of us have resources to meet local needs, but collectively, we can," said Executive Director, David Brewer.

The collaboration has organized a number of important local services including a free medical, dental, vision clinic, a gleaning service at farmer's markets, and a women's shelter in St. Johns called Community of Hope.

The warming shelter had been located at St. Johns Covenant Church on Portland Road until the building was sold. Pastor, Andy Goebel and the church's congregants have joined with Jules together and jointly host the shelter, which is open to all men, women and families. Both churches participate in AllOne Services.

The two joint churches also hope to provide permanent housing for lower income residents by using the land near their building for much needed affordable apartments. Developer, Rob Justus, has drawn up plans for 24 to 32 units with washers and dryers that would rent for around \$400 a month

Though the two churches have different styles of worship, they see collaboration as an example for others. "If two churches with different practices can come together
