

The proposed improvement of that part of Fifth street lying between the west line of lingh street and the county road near the west line of Van Buren street shall be completed as hereinafter provided within univery [90] days after the signing of the contract by the parties thereto, due notice thereof having been given by publication of notice as will more fully appear by proof thereof duly presented and filed in the office of the city recorder.

Section 2. The surface of the street shall be cleared of all timbers, plans or other obstructions used walks of lumber or cement of the proper width and che the proper grade and otherwise in good condition, accepted.) If the abstructions are not removed by the owners of the adjacent property within three days after notice from the superintendent of streets, they shall be removed by and become the property of the editactor.

Section 3. The improvements shall consist, as follows:

1. Grading the street the full width, and so much a dittonal as may be required to properly set the curbs and to such grade as the city surveyor shall direct, and to such cross section as the kind of improvement may require, as shown in the plans therefor.

A dry stone wall will be constructed at any flace where the filling is over two feet in depth, when the street is at sub-grade, and before the trenches are dug, the surface will, if decimed necessary by the surveyor, be rolled with a road roller of too less than five tons weight, and soft or spongy spots that may appear during the rolling shall be filled with dry earth, and rolled
