out, in dew and rain, than to its own sap. This moisture dries off more quickwhile the grass is standing than after it is cut. Hence the reason for cutting only when dry. Early planting is best for late varieties. Early varieties planted late are more subject to disease. Large seed is better than small and repays the additional cost. Uncut seed is better than an equal weight of cut seed. The value of manure of different kinds depends upon the season. A heavy dressing of farmyard manure applied in the spring is barely remunerative on the first year's results. Chemical manures should contain nitrogen, potash and phosphoric

acid in proper proportions. Imperfectly compounded chemical fertilizers do not Soot and kiln dust are barely remunerative in a dry season. Farmyard manures favor disease more than chemical fertilizers. In experimenting for the prevention

of disease two methods were employed—soaking the seed and spraying the plants. Seed was soaked for 24 hours in a solution made of six pounds each of sulphate of ammonia and nitrate of potash in 25 gallons of water. The tests showed that soaking seed in chemical solutions before planting is likely to be injurious, especially in some varieties. For spraying the plants two formulas of bordeaux mixture were used. In this series the indications were that some varieties are more subject to rot than others. Potatoes should be dug as soon as ripe, as the disease may be communicated to them while in the ground. Dressings of bordeaux mixture, while not preventing disease, greatly reduced the amount of diseased tubers and increased the yield of sound ones. The applications paid for their cost many times over. The copper solutions did not in any way affect the quality of the tubers.

Cutting Clover For Hay. The proper time to cut clover is just as it is coming into full bloom. Begin cut-ting after the dew has entirely disapting after the dew has entirely disappeared, say two or three hours after sunrise. After lying in the sun two or three hours it should be carefully tedded, avoiding rough handling and bruising. Before the dew falls in the afternoon, say about 4 or 5 o'clock, it must be raked up and placed in cocks four or five feet high. Next morning, after the sun is well up, the cocks should be opened and the hay spread not more than six inches thick. In the afternoon, about 6, haul to the barn and stow away loosely until thoroughly dry. Then it may be baled or packed away closely. When first put in the barn, it is good practice to sprinkle successive layers of the hay with comthe barn, it is good practice to sprinkle successive layers of the hay with common salt at the rate of about half a bushel of salt to the ton of hay. - Southern Cul-



It is especially popular with the packers, who like size above most things. The Duroc-Jersey is a very hardy hog, cold climates. The breed has been known in New Jersey for over half a century. The Duroc-Jersey Breeders' association was formed in 1883. It adopted the fol-

ite rusty red swine: The true Duroc or Jersey bred should be long, quite deep bodied, not round, but broad on the back, and holding the width well out to the hips and hams. The head should be small compared with the body, with the cheek round and full, with considerable breadth between the eyes. Neck short and thick, face slightly curved, the nose rather longer than in the English breeds, the ears rather large and lopped over the eyes and not erect. Bone not fine, nor yet coarse, but medium. Legs medium in size and length, set well under the body and well apart, and not cut up high in the flank or above the knee. Hams should be broad and full well down to the hock. The true Duroc or Jersey bred should be long

There should be a good coat of hair of n dium fineness, inclining to bristles at top of the shoulders, the tail being hairy and not small, the hair usually straight, but in some cases a little wavy. The color should be red, varying from dark, glossy, cherry red and even brownish hair to light yellowish red, with occasionally a small fleck of black on belly and legs.
