Food for Rapid Growth. A successful poultry keeper says: Full thirty hours should elapse after the chick leaves the shell before it is given food. The best thing I know for the first ferv meals is state graham-bread crumbs atte with a little raw egg. An occa-bional meal of stiff bolled rice or dry rolled oatmeal may be given, but state graham bread or mufins may well be the basis of the food for several weeks, being moistened with milk if convenient or with hot water, into which an egg has been stirred.
