Fortunes for the Few.

A limited class have conceived and put in practice a system of trade, in which they make the great body of the people pay high prices for commodities which the comparatively small class has to sell, and the government is called in to rob the many for the benefit of the few. The unproliferated classes not only supply the whole country with their products free of bounty, but exported a surplus exceeding \$800,000,000 last year, turning the balance of trade heavily in our favor, paying off our foreign indebtedness and diffusing prosperity over the land in defiance of the high tariff handicapping of pampered greed, which like the horse leech's daughter, cries always for more.—Daily Oregonian, Jan. 28, 1914.

EVENTS OF THE WEEK

SPECIAL SESSION OF COUNTY COURT.

At the special session of the county court on May 24th, the delinquent tax roll, reported by the sheriff, was approved by the court and the clerk ordered to make a copy thereof, attach a warrant thereon and return the same to the sheriff for collection. The amount reported delinquent was \$21,000. The sheriff was ordered to have election booths made for Oregon City precinct No. 3 and for other precincts that may have a deficiency, the same to be made of wood or canvas. The order of court made at last regular term appointing viewers to view and locate a road of public easement for Peter and W. A. Wise was rescinded, the principal reason being that the petition didn't mention the lands through which the road was to go.

What It Cost.—The case of Oregon vs. L. LeMahieu cost Clackamas county \$220.20. This was the libel case of Ed Madlock against the County two years ago. The grand jury found a bill, the taxpayers found another one, and as soon as election was over the case was withdrawn. It seemed rather strange that Mr. Madlock didn't let the county come to trial and vindicate himself when he had a sure thing on the libel and the county to foot the bills. Funny, too, that he should expect the people to elect him to one of the best offices in their gift.—Industrial Herald.

Mr. Madlock didn't begin the suit until some time after the election, and after the grand jury had returned an indictment and the case was pressed for trial by defendant's counsel, Mr. Madlock with defendant's consent, withdrew the suit.

PICKLED SALMON RELISH.—The following Norwegian way of preparing salmon for the table should be tried by those who love this prehistoric production of the streams of the northwest: A whole salmon is dressed, cut open in the back, and the spine removed. The sides are cut in handsome slices and placed in layers in a cooking pot with pepper, bay leaves, salt, great dill and a little water. It is carefully skimmed while boiling. When thoroughly cooked the pieces are taken out and put in a bowl. The broth that made is strained and then boiled with some gelatin, two beaten whites of eggs and half a cup of vinegar. The salmon is put in a large stone dish and covered with the dressing. The whole becomes a firm mass. It is served cold with a slight dressing of vinegar, sugar and pepper.

A NEW BRICK BUSINESS BLOCK.—Plans are now being prepared for erecting on the Stratton residence property on Main street, between E. G. Canfield and C. A. Canfield, a one-story brick building, having a frontage of 60 feet and a depth of about 70 feet. The intention is to divide the structure into three stories. As there will be very desirable for business not alone on account of the central location but because they will be provided with all modern conveniences and appliances, the scheme, no doubt, will be contracted for long before being finished, by prominent business firms, as there will be none superior in the city. Oregon City for its size is the liveliest city in the Willamette valley.

A POINT WELL MADE.—A communication from Capt. J. T. Apperson appeared in the Salem Democrat of last week, which concludes: "Governor Penney having approved the plan of creating a new compensation beyond the constitutional limit, is estopped from criticizing unjustly Judge Gallo-way (president of the state board of agriculture) or any other official, for having received compensation under a law not in conflict with the constitution, except in its provision increasing the governor's salary. It is not clear that this salary-grabber is relieving himself from the just odium that should attach to him by making groundless charges against other candidates?"

PACIFIC COAST NOTES.

A number of fruit-growers from various counties in the state met at Portland recently and organized the Oregon Fruit Union, the object of which is to facilitate the marketing of Oregon green and dried fruits and to create a demand for them in the East.

It is reported that a number of Portland fruit-growers are "letting out" when the Oregonian puts in its type-setting machines, propose to start a new daily paper. It would be conducted on the co-operative plan and the projectors are meeting with much encouragement.

Rev. Sam Driver, a good Methodist minister of Placerville, Cal., has donated with \$1,000 and a gushing widow from that place, leaving a wife and several children. He had borrowed the money to go to camp meeting with his wife and children. L. D. Driver, of Salem, the windy republican republican rantier, who by the way has a rather snitty reputation himself, if the files of the Oregonian can be relied on.

It has been openly stated by men interested in the Astoria railroad project, that it is impossible to borrow money in the East until after the Oregon voters have decided the election. Did Your Silage Freeze?

Professor F. H. King of the agricultural experiment station at Madison, Wis., wants dairymen and cattle breeders everywhere to send him answers to the questions in the following circular.

In the last annual report of this station, page 59, it was indicated that we needed the opinion of a severe winter to settle the question, "Is it impossible to prevent silage from freezing?" This question is of great importance to dairymen and cattle breeders, as the silage bearing on the freezing of silage should be complete. It is with this object in view that this circular of inquiry is mailed to you. Will you have the kindness to fill it out with the greatest care and return at your earliest convenience.

First—Has your silage frozen at any time during the winter?

Second—Where has the freezing occurred?

Third—How many inches in from the walls has it frozen?

Fourth—Has the freezing in any way damaged the silage?

Fifth—Where silage has frozen has it remained so through warm periods?

Sixth—How have you managed your frozen silage?

Seventh—Does your freezing result in any serious waste of silage?

Eighth—Have you observed that freezing injures the silage for feeding?

Ninth—Give any additional facts bearing on this subject which may appear to you of value.

Does Dairying Pay?

We find that it requires 28 pounds of milk from the average dairy to make a pound of butter. Now, if the average cow produces 3,000 pounds of milk, and it takes 28 pounds of it to make one of butter, we find she has produced 107 pounds.

We also find that the average price for butter during the past three years, received by dairymen, to be about 28 cents, or about \$3.50 for the annual income of the average cow. I will leave it with you to say, "Does dairying pay?"

I should say the income of the average cow should be at least \$50 to make dairying a prosperous business. The dairy is about the only industry that will pay the farmer of this country, and who that fails to ask, "What shall we do?" and echo answers, "Keep better cows."—C. W. Jennings.
