The Wesminster Gazette, which gave prominence to the original report, flippantly remarks with regard to the contradiction that "any allusion to the indisposition of any royal person appears to be considered at court as a species of treason, the court preferring that the ailments of such personage shall be ignored until the rattles are in their throats, and when the sovereign or prince or princess happens to be dangerously ill the public are always informed that the invalid is going on favorably, although, as a matter of fact, he or she is at that time going as fast as possible to the grave."

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
