The speech of the German Chancellor in the Reichstag, in which he made a strong point of the discrimination imposed by the United States to ward German sugar, is believed to indicate a strengthening of the policy which that government has adopted directed to the exclusion or severe restriction upon the American products songht to be imported into Germany. At present Mr. Runyon, our Minister to Germany, is working hard to secure an amelioration of the stringent order of exclusion in the case of American cattle, and Secretary Gresham is in almost daily consul-Board of Commissioners for Foreign Missions more than any other missionary organization in America centralizes its work in behalf of Armenians in Asiatic Turkey. A document has been prepared near the scene of the carnage purporting to give the judgment of the people that the thousands slain in Talvorie met their just deserts, and expressing regrets that it had been thought best to send Consuls to investigate since there has been no need for their coming. 
