THE SITUATION. The condition of the national treasury is a result of the maladministration of the republican party under President Harrison.

WHERE THE GOLD GOES. The following table gives the amount of gold in the principal European banks on January 17 of this year and January 18 of last year.

Table with columns for countries (England, France, Germany, etc.) and gold amounts for 1895 and 1894.

It thus appears that this country lost in gold exports last year \$81,300,000 the chief European banks gained just about twice that amount.

The gold reserve in our treasury on January 12 of last year was \$74,108,149. On the 1st of January this year it was \$86,000,000.

The story that the Hawaiian government was selling bonds at 25 cents on the dollar for the purpose of influencing legislation in this country in favor of annexation is met by the statement that just now the Hawaiian treasury is in better condition than the treasury of the United States.

THE LEGISLATURE.

Bills Appropriating Over a Million Introduced.

The legislature has but eight working days yet and still nothing except the passage of a few town charter bills has been done.

The Oregon City charter bill was introduced by Brownell on Wednesday and passed the senate.

The present session was supposed to be of the retraction order, but an analysis of some bills that have introduced in the senate is as follows: Bills introduced to abolish extravaganzas, three as follows:—state board of equalization, state board of horticulture, and repealing the jute mill act; bills creating new commissions, 12 as follows:—state horticultural inspector, bank board of commerce, state and county bank examiner, state irrigation engineer, state treasurer, state auditor and food commissioner, salary \$100 per year and expenses.

McAllister—for improvement Willows canyon, \$2000. Brownell—state bank commissioner, salary \$2500 per year and traveling expenses \$2000 per annum.

Brownell—state irrigation engineer, salary \$3000 per annum. Price—examiner of state and county treasurers, salary \$1000 per annum. Maxwell—graded school at Tillamook, \$5000.

Holt—state assessor, salary \$1000 per annum and traveling expenses. Calbreath—state horticultural and food commissioner, salary \$1000 per year and expenses.

Gowan—graded school at Burns, \$3000. Scriver—fish commissioner, salary \$2000 per annum, \$500 per annum for salaries and \$500 each for five deputies.

Calbreath—state horticultural and food commissioner, salary \$1000 per year and expenses. Maxwell—fish hatchery at Tillamook, \$3000.

Raley—state grain inspector, \$7500 per annum. Gesner—sallder's home, \$13,000. Raley—state board of horticulture, \$15,000 per annum.

Tax relief of Tillamook county, \$2,028.18; Washington county, \$6,998.33; Harney, \$849.96; Union, \$9,694.33. Relief of L. J. Templeton, \$20,000.

A bill of considerable interest to lumber districts is one introduced by Senator Brownell. It divides the state into 12 lumber districts. Each lumber inspector or his deputy shall receive for measuring or sealing logs or similar timber the following fees: For one or more rafts or lots of less than 200,000 feet, 4 cents per 1000 feet; for one or more rafts or lots of 200,000 feet or more, 3 cents per 1000 feet. Fees to be collected from the buyer and seller of said logs.

The present session is now three-quarters gone and absolutely nothing of importance has been done. The session opened on January 14th and the regular day term expires at midnight on Saturday, February 23d. There is but nine days remaining.

Senator Patterson's woman's suffrage bill created not a little discussion in the senate and was adopted by a vote of 17 to 11, absent Carter and Maxwell.

The legislative committee on the amendment tending the right of suffrage to women were: Bancroft, Butler, Calbreath, Cogswell, Huston, McAllister, McGinn, Raley, Smith of Clatsop, Woodard. Adopted in house: Adams, Beach, Burke, Cardwell, Chetron, Curtis, Keel, Long, McCracken, McGreer, Paxton, Thompson voting no.

The legislative committee on the Oregon State Secular Union, consisting of Katie Kehn Smith, secretary of the union, Mrs. A. E. Barker and Hon. Leo Langhin last week and an audience before the house committee on assessment and taxation. The Secular Union wants a total separation of state and church and that all church property be taxed.

Up to Monday but thirteen bills have passed and received the approval of the governor. All but one are town incorporation bills. It costs from four to twenty times more to maintain the O. N. G. than is expended far like purposes in other states. Here is a chance to retrace.

One of the reasons why there will be no radical legislation against railroads this session or for many seasons, can be found in the fact that a large part of Oregon has no railroads and that every locality needs and wants one, and the representatives of these localities do not propose to take any action that will discourage the building or extension of branches or main lines.

The clerkship business is an abuse—a regular clerk for political hangers-on. Many clerks of the present session have not as yet touched pen to paper. Their salary is going on, however.—Statesman.

Representative Hoier has introduced a bill prepared with some care by Mr. Hoier, the State banker, providing a penalty of \$1000 to \$5000 fine and from one to five years imprisonment for bank officials who receive deposits knowing their bank insolvent. The banking committee has agreed unanimously upon a favorable report.

It has recently developed that at least four men say they voted for Bigler Brownell in the senatorial caucus, three Lane county men and Secretary Brownell, yet only two Hermann votes were found in the lot!
