A BEAUTIFUL SIGHT.—Tuesday evening as the young moon was sailing toward its northwestern exit from human vision, all observant eyes were attracted toward the beautiful spectacle presented by a planetary combination not often witnessed. The evening star Venus and the moon were in "conjunction," and so close and peculiarly situated in the range of vision from this latitude as to be remarkably pretty. About 9 o'clock Venus stood to the left of the moon, almost close enough to resemble the pictures of the star and crescent, but the movements of the two bodies varied their positions and held the beholders' attention for nearly two hours. The star seemed to move in an arch around the moon to the northward. At one time it stood immediately on the crest of the "old moon," resembling a small light protruding from the upper surface of a dark globe. Again it stood so close to the upper "horn," of the moon as to resemble a knob on the end of it and finally as both sank behind the west side hills the star was on the north side of the moon, in direct "conjunction," with it, both resplendent in a rich yellow light, enhanced in its depth of beauty by a partial smoky condition of the atmosphere.

BARLOW CREAMERY.—The creamery is turning out more butter and better butter right along, more patrons being added almost daily. The yield of butter is better than average. In order to illustrate the advantages of a creamery a lady, by request, weighed out 19½ pounds of milk and churned it, getting 10 ounces of butter, or an average of 31.5 pounds of milk to a pound of butter, while the creamery turns out a pound of butter to 20 pounds of milk. Take your pencil and figure out what price is necessary to cover expenses of making up. The saving in labor should also be considered—Three Sisters. This shows that the creamery is a success. Stock in the company is at par. A few more creameries like this in the county would be a good thing for the farmer.

ANOTHER HATCHERY.—Hon. J. W. Crawford, state fish commissioner of Washington, W. F. Hubbard, superintendent of Clackamas fish hatchery, and ex-Senator Seaberg, of Pacific county, made a trip up the Kalama river Saturday to select the site for the state fish hatchery that is to be located on the Kalama river. Superintendent Hubbard expressed himself as being well pleased with the Kalama river as a place for the hatchery, as the gravel bottom and deep pools of clear water made the Kalama river a natural spawning ground for salmon, and he thinks that the commission selected to locate the hatchery used excellent judgment in selecting the Kalama river as a more natural spot could not be found.

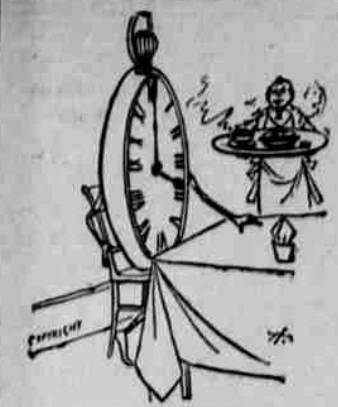
Mr. Stogdell is able to be a bout again.

ATTENTION, WATER CONSUMERS!

Rules and regulation regarding the use of water have been amended in the following particulars:
Rate for sprinkling, in addition to household or store use, shall be \$1 for the season, payable June 1st of each year. This includes use of hose any time during the year.

Rate for irrigation or sprinkling where water is not used for other purposes shall be \$2 per month or \$5 for the season from May 1st to October 1st, payable in advance.

Vegetable gardeners special rates. Section 15 provides that consumer will only be allowed to use water for irrigation or lawn sprinkling between the hours of 9 and 9 a. m. and 5 and 9 p. m.

Allowing water to run all day or night is positively forbidden.
