Justices Ordered to Not Bill Up Unnecessary Costs in Their Courts.
G. E. Hayes, judge, F. Jagger and R. Scott, commissioners.
Report of viewers on petition of Robt. Thompson et al for a change in the Engle and Noland mill road approved and road ordered opened; expense \$16.81.
Report of viewers on petition of G. C. Kenney et al for a county road approved and road ordered opened; expense \$28.70.
Petition of J. E. Welyter et al for drainage of pond at Milwaukie denied for want of jurisdiction.
Application of H. E. Noble for money paid for land erroneously sold at tax sale granted; amount \$19.90.
C. H. Foster appointed constable of justice district No. 6.
Ordered that the justices of the peace of this county be instructed not to institute criminal proceedings against any person, except in extreme cases, without the advice and consent of the district attorney or deputy.
Claim of Lindsley & Sons for lumber on Oregon City and Apperson road for \$137.22 paid out of district 4 road fund.
Petition of Carl A. Rath et al for viewers to a change in George road granted and Surveyor Kinnaird, Jno C. Tracy, W. P. Baker and Wm Howlett appointed to view, to meet at 10 o'clock on Saturday, October 26th.
Petition of E. A. Sellwood et al for vacation of streets and alleys in Minthorn addition to Portland laid over.
Petition of Geo Williams et al for the vacation and change of streets and alleys in Minthorn granted and J. W. Meldrum, N. O. Walden and Geo Waldron appointed viewers.

Report of viewers on Oregon City and New Era road approved and change in said road established as recommended by said viewers; Commissioner Jagger dissenting.
Petition denied of school district No. 62 for warrant to be issued for the collection of taxes due from R. P. Mills Co.
Contract for construction of bridge across Butte Creek on the J. W. Drake road awarded to C. F. Royal for \$968 and \$11 per 1000 for approach, to be completed in 60 days; Road Master Kinnaird to superintend.
Bids to supply county with records, blanks, stationary, etc., for one year received from Corvuss, Weston & Dygert, Glass & Prudhomme, Irwin-Hodson Co and C. G. Huntley. All bids rejected and lists to be prepared and bids received on November 7 at 2 p. m.
Treasurer ordered to pay state interest on taxes as follows: 1893 \$83.70 and for 1894 \$241.93.
Application of W. B. Wiggins to purchase tax certificate to lots 5 and 6 of block 48 of Oregon City granted.
Application of C. Muttermantel for tax rebate laid over.
Ordered that penalty be remitted if Addie C. Hodgkins pays her taxes, costs and interest from date of sale.
Officers reported receipts as follows: Clerk \$298.56, recorder \$172.65, sheriff \$14.60, total \$485.75.
Eleven dollars per month appropriated for care and keeping of Mrs. Mary Ross and child.
Allowance heretofore made for care and keeping of Prof. Charles Cutting discontinued.
