A TAX ON KNOWLEDGE.

The formation of the paper trust, for the purpose of regulating the production and fixing arbitrarily the price of printing paper, suggests one amendment to tha tariff which enlighted and honest men of all parties should support.

All taxes upon paper are taxes upon reading, upon knowledge, upon the dissemination of information. Under any government such a tax would be oppressive and proscriptive. In a government based as ours is, upon the intelligence and resultant virtue of the people, it is anomalous and monstrous. To make newspapers artificial ly dear is wantonly to restrict the number of readers and so increase the sum of ignorance. When this is done or proposed simply to add to the profits of a monopoly, the injury to public interests becomes a matter demanding the intervention of the government.

Senator Sherman, the ablest republican now in public life, said when the McKinley bill was under consider ation that if in any schedule the increased duties led to the formation or the strengthening of trusts and monopolies, a danger which he feared, he would vote to repeal the protection thus abused. The formation of a paper trust would be a sufficient provocation to such action, independent of any scheme of general tariff reform, which the public sentiment of the country desires to have postponed for four or five years in the interest of business stability and peace. No trust must be permitted to put a tax on reading.

In commending the work of Lieutenant Peary in Arctic exploration, General Greely makes some pertinent observations about those critics who fail to see the value of anything that is not directly productive in dollars and cents. "There of dollars on athletics, baseball, football, etc., while still others see nothing but bitterness arising from horse racing and yachting contests.
