In the case of Tomasine Endy vs. Thomas Charman, wherein the plaintiff sued on a promisory note made in 1872 by J. M. Bacon, with the defendant as surety, the jury Monday rendered a sealed verdict which was opened Tuesday morning. The verdict was in favor of the defendant.

JudgeMcBride Saturday morning gave decision in the celebrated case of H. C. Stevens vs. L. E. and Silas Wright, Reuben Wright, Elizabeth Coates, J. L. Crouse, Levi Stehman, A. E. Duff and James F. Relson, being for the foregiosure of a mortgage that had been candeled on the process.

After the sale of the note to Stevens, Charman, by mistake, is it alleged, canceled the mortgage. alleged, canceled the mortgage Stevens was not aware that a mortgage had been given to secure his note until about a year ago, and when he discovered the fact he at orce began suit to foreclose, not withstanding the cancellation on the record. The defendants, other than L. E. and Silas Wright, are purchasers of portions of the land covered upon the record showing the property to be from incumbances in order to get a clear title to the land.
