COMMITTEE MEETING.

OREGON CITY, Feb. 20, 1896. A meeting of the members of the Democratic County Central Committee of Clackamas county, will be held in Oregon City, Oregon, at the rooms of Fountain Hose Company No. 1, on Saturday, February 29th, at 2 o'clock p. m. A meeting of some of the prominent democrats of this city was held in the Willamette building on Monday evening, when it was decided to put a full ticket in the field to be voted by the democrats in June. The call for a county central committee meeting to be held on Saturday of this week appears at head of this column. All committees should be present. The democratic county convention will be held on April 4th to nominate officers and elect delegates to the state convention in Portland on April 7th.

A number of hop growers in this and other counties are ploughing up their hop vines, but we think as does the Salem Statesman that growers who are ploughing up their yards are making a mistake. As we have said so many times before, the Willamette valley can grow hops cheaper than can England or New York. The prices will not be, main below the cost of production for long. The sections of the world not so favorably conditioned as our valley will be obliged to go out of the business. Then there will be a regular annual profit for our growers. The vines will last 150 years. We say, leave them in the ground, and keep the yards healthy. It will pay. There will be numerous years when the hop growers will be considered the most fortunate of our farmers. If it will not pay to pick when the time comes in any given year, then use the crop for fertilizer.

Among the most cruel of hopes have been those whose science has held out to consumptives. From time to time cures have been announced, only to prove failures. That dread consumption can be cured, we have no doubt; and that its cure will ultimately be discovered is equally certain.
