DEMOCRATIC COUNTY CONVENTION.

The Democratic County Convention of Clackamas county, Oregon, is hereby called to meet in Oregon City, on Saturday, April 4th, 1896, for the purpose of nominating candidates for the following offices, to be voted for at the general election to be held on the first Monday in June, 1896: Three representatives, a county commissioner, county clerk, county recorder, county sheriff, county treasurer, county assessor, county school superintendent, county surveyor and county coroner, and judges of the peace and constables for the several justice districts in the county; and for the further purpose of choosing eight delegates to represent Clackamas county in the Democratic State Convention, to be held in Portland on the 9th day of April, 1896, at 11 o'clock a. m.

The county convention will be composed of 96 delegates, apportioned to the different precincts as follows:

Total number of delegates: 96.

The committee recommend that primaries for the purpose of choosing such delegates, be held at the usual voting places in the different precincts (except in Milk Creek precinct, where the voting places is changed to Grange Hall near Howards) on Saturday, March 28, 1896, at such hour as the committee for the several precincts may designate. The judges and clerks of primary elections to be appointed by the committees of the respective precincts.

The declaration of principles is left for promulgation by the convention. By order of the County Central Committee.

Work to be given only to those qualified to do a full day's work. The supervisor to work as those employed by him.
