LOCAL EVENTS.

PRIME PAGENT DEAD,-Hon. Peter Paquet died at his residence on lower Main on last Thursday at 10 p. m. The funeral services were held at the house on Sunday at 10 a. m. under the auspices of the Free Masons and were largely attended. He leaves a widow and three difidren -Louise, Plorence and Victor, and two brothers in Portland -Joseph and Louis. Mr. Paquet was born in St. Louis, Mo., on January 13th, 52 years ago. In 1852, with his parents, he made the six months' trip across the plains to Oregen, and the family settled at Canemah. There Peter and his brothers learned the trade of boatbuilding, which ther followed the greater part of their lives, though Peter was also a millwright and bridgebuilder, and did a great deal of general contracting. In 1870 he entered political life as a representative in the legislature. Two years later he was nominated by the republicens for county clerk, in 1874 for state senstor, and in 1882 for county judge, In 1888 he was again chosen representa-tive in the legislature, and re-elected at the expiration of that term. In municipal politics Mr. Paquet served nine terms as councilman, one term as mayor, and three terms as president of the board of fire delegates. He recently retired from the receivership of the United States land office here, after creditable service for four years. For several years he gave more or less of his attention of the compilation of a history of the local Masonic lodge, which was the first one organised west of St. Louis, but he left that work unfinished.
