

LOCAL EVENTS.

A CANBY MURDER.—Conrad Neibert, the Canby saloon-keeper, was shot through the body Thursday night by one of two men, who attempted to rob him. It was about 10 o'clock and Neibert had just locked the front door preparatory to going to his home, nearby. There was a knock at the door and Neibert opened it. Two masked men stepped in, immediately covered the saloon-keeper with a revolver and demanded that he throw up his hands. Neibert did not throw up his hands, but ran for the rear door, to reach which he had to pass through an arch and another door. He was in the act of closing the inner door after having passed through it when one of his assailants fired, sending a 41-caliber bullet through the door panel, the ball shattering the end of Neibert's left thumb and entering his left side below the heart. It ranged slightly upward and came out at the right side. The wounded man did not fall, but ran to his house, only a few feet distant. His assailants hurriedly left the place after firing the shot, making no search for money or other property. They dropped their wire masks about 40 feet from the saloon, and there is no further trace of them. Neibert died Sunday morning. He was 47 years old and leaves a widow and four children. No clue to the murderers has been found.

FOR A BICYCLE ROAD.—N. A.
