STOCKHOLDERS MEETING.—The annual meeting of Willamette Savings and Loan Association was held on Saturday evening at office of treasurer, the Bank of Oregon City, and the following directors were elected: W. P. Hawley, Geo. Broughton, W. A. Huntley, Geo. A. Harding, Rudolph Koerner, J. P. Logan, E. G. Caulfield, L. L. Porter and E. E. Charman. The auditors elected were C. P. Thore, Max Bolkack and A. W. Cheney. The board elected E. G. Caulfield president, A. W. Huntley vice-president, H. K. Jones secretary, Bank of Oregon City treasurer, and L. L. Porter attorney. An adjourned meeting will be held on March 29th to increase the capital stock from \$50,000 to \$100,000, the first shares of stock having been nearly subscribed for. The association is in a prosperous condition and expenses of running the business is but \$11 per month or about 3 cents per share. The association now has some money on hand for loans on real estate.
