A Word About Pruning.

This is the season of the year that the tree butcher gets in his work. The "expert proper" with ax, saw, and a pair of hedge shears, and who trims trees down to mere stumps, is about offering his services. Orchardists should give him a wide berth. This is applicable to all parts of Oregon, but the thought has been suggested by institute workers returning from Southern Oregon who report over proped orchards as about the worst feature of orcharding in that part

A healthy tree well headed at the start, the head twenty to thirty inches from the ground, needs only to have deformed, crotched, and crossed limbs removed, with now and then a branch taken out to thin out the top. The shape of the tree should be governed by pinching, and removing small twigs with a budding knife. All other pruning is unnecessary, and a wanton destruction that seriously impairs the vitality and usefulness of the tree.-U. P. Hedrick.


