**A PIONEER GONE.**—James Athey, aged 81 years, and a pioneer of 1843, died at the home of his daughter, Mrs. Sarah Campbell, on Monday noon of apoplexy. James Athey and his young wife came across the plains from Missouri with the famous company of 1843, that was piloted by Dr. Whiteman—the company that brought the first wagon train over the mountains, and demonstrated the practicability of reaching the far land of Oregon overland. They located in Oregon City, and lived the remainder of their lives here. Mrs. Athey died the 11th of last February, at the age of 70 years. And now follows her partner of 53 years. Their surviving children are Morrison and John of Idaho, Charles, Mrs. Sarah Campbell and Mrs. John Baxter of this city and Mrs. Homer Holland of Salem. The funeral services were held on Wednesday.
