**THE CYCLE PATH.**—Work on the cycle path between Oregon City and Portland is rapidly assuming tangible shape, and before the wheelmen are aware it will be completed. It has been practically completed from Portland to Milwaukie, except to bring it down the hill into that place. From Sellwood the path has been graded out along the electric line to the point where it makes a turn to Milwaukie street. The path from this point leaves the track, and goes directly north along the banks of the river for some distance and then swings over to the Milwaukie road at Midway, from which point nothing has been done, but construction will be comparatively easy along the road. It has the river in full view for a considerable portion of the distance. It also deflects into the foliage at various points. The whole path as selected will be a popular one. That it will be completed there is hardly a doubt. Wheelmen and citizens must be credited for their enterprise, although, of course, they were deeply interested in the completion of the path.

**SOLD WRONG LAND.**—Wm. Westburg was on Saturday held to the grand jury by Justice Schuebel on the charge of perpetrating a fraud upon C. M. Crittenden in selling to the latter one tract of land while representing it to be another and a much more valuable tract. The state examined four witnesses, whose testimony went to show that Westburg had knowledge of the fact that the land he occupied was not the land described in the deed by which he claimed title and that he had tried to get the matter rectified before he concluded to dispose of the property. On account of the matter being tied up in an unsettled estate, it could not be straightened out at once, so Westburg sold the property as it was, without making any explanation to the purchaser. The defense presented no testimony. A bond in the sum of \$500 was given and the defendant released.
