Farmers are busy cutting grain in this locality. What little fall wheat there was sown last fall has all been cut. The yield will be light. Spring grain is going to be good. The hum of the threshing machine will be heard here next week.

The teazel cutting is about finished. S. E. Gregory has finished cutting his teazels and had about three thousand baskets. A. J. Sawtell will finish cutting his crop in a few days.

It is reported that the hop-lice is running some yards in this vicinity and unless something is done to check them there will be but little picking done here this season.
