PLEASE PAY UP.

The season of the year has arrived when the proprietor of a newspaper naturally expects to receive some compensation for his labors.

The agreement of the congressional committee to recommend T. T. Geer of Marion county for the registration of the Oregon City land office does not tend to close the breach between the different factions of the republican party in this county.

UNCLE SAM is not sharing the prosperity caused by the advance in the price of wheat. His income for the eight weeks of the present fiscal year is \$25,000,000 short of his expenses.
