The president on Wednesday appointed O. B. Moores of Salem as register of the Oregon City land office. He will accept.

We have been ruled by a king, we have been governed by an aristocratic parliament, we are now apparently entering upon a period of government by judges—the worst form of autocracy.

A much abused editor of a weekly paper published in Ohio, has drafted the following game law. Book agents may be killed from September 1 to October 1; spring poets, March 1 to July 1; scandal mongers, any time; whales, August 1 to January 1; the man who never pays his subscription, as well as the antiquarian, two-penny-businessman, who thinks it doesn't pay to advertise, may be killed from January 1 to December 31, without recourse or any relief from valuation or appraisement laws.

Secretary Wilson has sent out to about five thousand sugar beet growers instructions how to prepare the beets for shipment to the laboratories for test as to the amount of sugar the beets contain. Professor Wilson, who has charge, thinks that at least twenty-five thousand beet growers will furnish samples to be tested. Some samples have already been received.

GERR REFUSED.

Hon. T. T. Geer of Macleay in refusing the registration of the Oregon City land office said:

"I was not a candidate for that place, and had no recommendations for that place. My application and all of my recommendations were for the position of collector of customs of the port of Portland, and that was the position I wanted, and my friends wanted me to have. I was sidetracked by the delegation, without my consent; I was not consulted in the matter at all, and the endorsement and recommendation for the land office, made by these gentlemen, was entirely unauthorized by me. I have, therefore, after looking over the situation, and consulting with my friends, declined the position of register of the land office, and I am still a candidate for collector of customs, as before. I am urged to this by republicans from every portion of Oregon, every mail bringing me to take this stand."

We have no doubt but that our beloved Billie Bryan, the plain son of plain people of Illinois, will some day be president. It will be when plutocracy has had its rage and it is discovered that a nation of political equals cannot be governed by concessions to the favored classes and injunctions to restrain the masses. If such a policy does not hurl our fair land into an industrial revolution we are much mistaken. Laws that are aimed at trust like the coal combine, that doubles the price of fuel cutting the miners from \$1.25 a ton to 35 cents (see commissioner's report in Indiana) are now only enforced against the laborer and he will never get relief until some man like Bryan is made president.—Salem Journal.

Justice Clark, of the supreme court of this state, one of the ablest jurists and economic writers in the country, who at first favored government control, now takes the same position. And in fact is the position that all must take who are sincerely opposed to the bleeding of the public and the robbery of the government by monopolies and trusts. The greatest issue of modern times is now squarely drawn—there is no middle ground—there are but two sides. The government must own and operate all national monopolies in the interest of the public, or these monopolies will own and operate the government in their own interest. This and the money question will be the two overshadowing issues in the campaign of 1900.—Senator Marion Butler of N. C.
