GAVE UP THE FIGHT.

Henry Watterson, editor of the Louisville Courier-Journal, it appears from the following, deems useless to attempt to maintain the gold democracy organization longer against such odds. He says: "The gold democrats of Kentucky will certainly not embroil and embitter their lives by a prolonged struggle against such odds to save the country and the party from the abyss of the revolution to which the preachments of men like Mr. Bryan of Nebraska and Henry George, to say nothing about Senator Tillman and Gov. Altgeld, are hurrying all who follow their lead. What the rest can stand, we can stand. We are democrats, not republicans, and if it be the destiny of the country to become the sport and prey of the professional, partisan politicians, swinging the pendulum from one to the other dizzy height of radicalism, we shall go with the organized fools rather than the organized knaves; though we do not want to go with either."

IN A NUTSHELL.

New York, New Jersey and Kentucky cast fifty-eight electoral votes for McKinley, one of Kentucky's votes going to Bryan.

New York, New Jersey and Kentucky all went democratic last week.

Had McKinley been a candidate last week instead of last year the popular vote in these three democratic states would certainly have been cast against him.

Now, deduct these 58 electoral votes from the 271 which Mr. McKinley received, and there are left 213.

Add these 58 votes to the 176 of Mr. Bryan and he would have 234.

That is a majority of 21 in the electoral college.

In other words, the democrats do not need to gain another state. They need only retain these three—New York, New Jersey and Kentucky—and they will elect the next president.—N. Y. World.

POSTAL BANKS IN A CAMPAIGN.

In the sixth Illinois district a campaign for congressman is in progress to fill the vacancy caused by the death of Congressman Cooke. The sentiment for postal savings banks is so strong in Chicago that both party platforms pledge the candidates to work for them if elected.

In a recent speech Henry S. Boutell, the republican candidate said: "The people demand that congress at its next session shall provide for the establishment of postal savings banks under the control of the postoffice department, and a measure looking to this end would have my hearty support. Postal savings banks have given satisfaction to the people wherever they have been tried. Their existence in all parts of the country is a constant invitation to thrift and economy, and wherever thrift and economy prevail poverty, ignorance and crime disappear. The establishment of such a system of agencies for the reception of the smallest deposits would be in exact accordance with the principle which should characterize all our legislation—namely, the protection of the weakest. If we protect the weakest, we protect all."

The newest and most assertive administration organ warns the president to give no support to Secretary Gage's plan of currency reform. It tells him that any meddling with "the money of the people" will wreck his administration. This may be called the speculative, bond-syndicating, Wall street view. The currency is "good enough" for gold corners, treasury raiding and gambling operations. That our currency system with its nine kinds of money, is in a chaotic condition, which may easily become dangerous, experience abundantly proves. The republican party by its platform and by the words of the president is pledged to reform it. But it is not united upon any plan. It does not know what it wants.

A Democratic member of the Ohio legislature says he will not enter into any combination to defeat Hanna. He thinks that "Hanna in the senate would do more to bring about democratic success in 1900 than any other man the republicans of Ohio could send to represent them in that body." It is rather hard on Ohio and on the senate to purchase party advantage at such a cost, but there is no doubt that Hanna in the senate is a big and shining example of latter day republicanism would be worth more to the democrats in 1900 than a hundred ordinary stump-speakers.

An article in the Press attacks the churches because their bells are rung on Sunday. The editor of that sheet while looking for a new location might move to some country town where there are no churches and where the atmosphere is more congenial.
